"that's just the way things go, bad luck, nothing else to say about it"



Meaning making: four aspects

1. Appreciation: - negative - positive

"that was really a low point. I saw everything I had worked for.. Gone.. Or at least, everything became uncertain."



Meaning making: four aspects

2. Agency: - passive

- active

"I didn't expect it at all. You know, if they say 'you had a heart attack because you have smoked all your life' or something, then okay.. But this, it just happened to me"

- 3. Scope: situational
 - existential
 - religious

"I do believe that getting this heart condition happened for a reason. I don't believe in God or divine providence, but I feel that there is something higher that we cannot know."
