
Perceptions and experiences of nursing students about spirituality during the educational process: a meta-synthesis

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Background

In recent years, is increasing the importance of teaching spiritual care in nursing students. This review and meta-syntesis aims to interpret and synthesize the findings of qualitative evidence to understand the process of acquiring spiritual competencies of nursing students

Methods



Phase 1. Literature Review

Rigorous literature search according to the PRISMA method (Page et al., 2021) Studies from Pubmed, CINAHL, Cuiden Plus, PsycINFO, Cochrane and Web of Science were included. After PRISMA flow diagram (n=12) studies were included.

Phase 2. Quality Criteria

Review of the methodological quality of the selected articles using the Consolidated criteria for Reporting Qualitative Research tool (Tong et al., 2007) Finally, (n=11) studies were included.

Phase 3. Analysis of Results

Extraction and analysis of the results of the articles included in the review according to the methodology described by the authors Sandelowski and Barroso (Ludvigsen et al., 2016; Sandelowski, 2006)

Results

The years of publication of the studies ranged from 2015 to 2022. The studies were conducted in the USA (n = 1), Australia (n = 1), South Africa (n = 1), Norway (n = 2), Colombia (n = 1), Korea (n = 1), Chile (n = 1), Brazil (n = 1), the United Kingdom (n = 1), and the Netherlands (n = 1). The total number of nursing students who participated in the studies included in this meta-synthesis was 686 students.

Conclusion

Nursing students perceive a need for introspection and enhancement of self-concept and self-awareness regarding the intrapersonal dimension before addressing it in patients. Currently, their approach to spirituality and its care is based on personal experiences, cultures, and religions, rather than clinical and health-related training, which should be a key objective. Nursing students consider the acquisition of spiritual competencies essential for providing holistic care and explicitly request both undergraduate and ongoing interdisciplinary training.
